This year ASUWB is planning on making trips to Olympia to advocate for student needs and become more involved in the legislative process. This will be a great opportunity for students to speak to their legislative representatives and gain insight on their work. These trips will be separate from the school administration's yearly Olympia day trips and will be organized run by ASUWB.

With the need for another academic building and expected higher education budget cuts from the state, there is a need for an increase in student presence in Olympia. This will require ASUWB to make frequent trips to meet with legislative representatives and to be the liaison between the legislature and the students. ASUWB has used the current Government Relations funding to work together with the other UW campuses to hold a Legislative Reception at UW Seattle. The funding has also been used to join the Washington	

Students Association which is a coalition of colleges in Washington that work together to improve higher education for all students. This allows ASUWB to have a stronger voice when they are in Olympia advocating for student needs.

The legislative meetings in Olympia will be assessed through UCAR transportation and working with Kelly Snyder, the Director of Government and Community Relations. Any future unforeseen expenses will be assessed by contacting the appropriate individual.

All current students will have the opportunity to benefit from this program. Students are encouraged to travel to Olympia with ASUWB to speak with legislative representatives. The students that stand to gain the most out of this program are students on financial aid. The big topic in Olympia this year will be cutting higher education funding which includes the state funded financial aid programs. Every student can gain from this program because the result of the inevitable higher education cuts will be higher tuition. ASUWB will be advocating for affordable tuition and cannot gain financial support from any other resources because this is primarily a UW Bothell student event.

Question:

In 150 words or less, please describe the benefits that participants are likely to gain by attending or participating in this program or service.

One of the current talks in Olympia is cutting the state funded work study program. Unless they receive an exception, the only jobs international students are allowed to work are on-campus jobs. Another objective for ASUWB is to advocate against cutting financial aid programs. Currently 18% of the UW Bothell students receive aid from the Husky Promise program. The Husky Promise is contingent on the state funding for higher education. Another benefit is the new academic building which is ready to start construction in 2011. The key missing element to start the construction currently is state funding.
